A Message From the Desk of the Rev. Dr. Dave Melton

Dear Providence Family,

We will move into Lent next week with the observation of Ash Wednesday. I will have the privilege of helping to lead at least three of four different imposition of the Ashes services here at Providence UMC, beginning with members of our Executive Committee at 7:00 a.m.

One of the highlights of the day will be presenting the case for why we mark ourselves as followers of Christ with ashes on the developmental level of our 3-5 year old children in our Weekday School.

Two years ago after teaching, I asked: "So now are you excited about having the sign of the Cross made on your foreheads?" Most of the children nodded "yes," but one little girl shouted: "No!"

Actually I knew I shouldn't have asked that question as soon as the words left my mouth, because no one really wants the sign of the Cross marked on his or her forehead; because it is a sign of our finitude, our needfulness, and our mortality.

"From ashes to ashes, and dust to dust," means that we came from nothing and will return there, at least physically. But that doesn't include God in the equation.

God through Jesus makes everything in us new, including our bodies. That is the beauty of Lent, as we prepare for being made new through Easter.

I pray that you will be with us in worship through this season, as we worship through a series entitled: "The 'I Am' Sayings of Jesus." In that series we will talk about how Jesus saw Himself to be.

This week our theme is: "The Alpha And Omega." I'm excited about the series, and hope you will be too. Bring a friend with you.

Haiti and Mission Attic Sale Announcement - Our Attic Sale continues to impact our Haiti and local missions, provides an incredible opportunity of engagement for our congregation and brings many people into our building for the sale. At the same time it is an all-consuming effort for the attic sale chairs, our facility, staff and volunteers. After a time of conversation and discernment we have decided to pause the sale in 2018 to access how we may work better together to determine if we may be able to shorten and streamline the processes. An Attic Sale task team is being formed to begin discussions and redesign the ministry. If you would like to serve on this team please contact me. Furthermore, our focus will be on continuing to serve the Haitian people, those in our community and to provide opportunities for our congregation to serve in meaningful ways.

A huge "THANK YOU" to outgoing Mission Council chairs Tom and Elaine Foster for their dedication and support of the mission efforts of Providence UMC. Both have been supporters of missions both locally and abroad. We appreciate your leadership of the Missions Council! Our new chair is Chris Sutherland.

Haiti Update - CHANGING LIVES! Twenty-eight wells have been completed from the Christmas Miracle Offering from 2016! We have enough funds to complete eight more wells which will be completed in the first quarter of 2018. The impact of clean water to Northern Haiti will be significant for years to come. Our trusted partner, Dr. Eugene, attributes a decline of cholera cases to our efforts and dedication to providing clean, safe water.

From funds raised by the 2017 Haiti and Mission Attic Sale, a roof was completed in early 2018 at the Annex School of the College of John Wesley. The school is located in a very challenged area of Cap Haitien. The roof will complete the construction of the school and will keep standing mosquito infested water from pooling on the upper level. It also created space for four more classrooms which will be utilized to begin a secondary school on site. To date, Providence UMC has provided a well, a flushing latrine system and a roof for the Annex School. The principal of the school and a pastor in the community said "Glory to God and Thank You! This is a dream come true!"

Have you ever wondered where the cleaning buckets, hygiene kits and school kits go after they leave Providence UMC? UMCOR's relief supply depot, Sager Brown, is located in Baldwin, Louisiana. Volunteers assemble, verify, and pack relief-supply kits so that they can be sent to the areas where they are needed most. Participants also help with outreach programs in the depots' local communities. Per person cost is \$300 per person plus airfare to Louis Armstrong New Orleans International Airport.



When individuals who have experienced long-term homelessness finally move into their home, it can be very overwhelming! We want to provide kits to help ease their transition into housing and provide them with basic items that address everyday needs. A list of items for the kits may be found online. We challenge each Sunday School Class, Life Group or other small groups to donate funds or collect items for one Welcome Home Kit. **Completed kits are due by February 28 and may be placed in the Missions Center**, at a location designated by a poster. February 14 - Ash Wednesday Services

What is Ash Wednesday and the Season of Lent?

Ash Wednesday, February 14, marks the beginning of Lent, a period of penitence that commemorates Jesus' 40 days of fasting and temptation in the desert. The season of Lent ends on Easter, April 1, as we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord. The purpose of the Lenten Season is to focus one's mind and heart on Christ. Often, individuals "give something up" during the 40 days. While the act of self-denial serves as a means of remembering Jesus' fasting, it serves a deeper purpose in making one mindful of those things which are more holy.
